# Religious reorientation in Southern Mali - Tabulation report



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### Introduction

Tables in the present report are the results of the quantitative part of the study "Islamism in Southern Mali: Implications for the Malian polity". The survey was conducted in June/July 2014 in collaboration between the Fafo Institute of Applied International studies and GREAT Mali. The study did also have a qualitative part based on interviews with the main stakeholders.

While the increasing significance of radical Salafist Islam in the North of the country is well known, the radicalization of belief in the South has received much less attention. The main aim of the project was to increase the understanding of the characteristics and politics of Muslim groups in Southern Mali. Also, the project aims to explore the ways in which radicalization excludes women from social and political processes, insights that should inform the assessment of possibilities for – and nature of – engagement of civil society and formal political organizations in the reconciliation process.

The study has been founded by the Royal Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

## **Technical aspects of the survey**

The information about sampling and other technical aspects of the survey is described in Appendix 1. However, a brief description is given here. The survey was conducted on a representative sample of households from the five southern regions in Mali (Kayes, Koulikoro, Ségou, Sikasso and Mopti, in addition to Bamako). Stratification was done between urban and rural area. In each stratum, 45 clusters were randomly selected, and in each cluster, 15 households were randomly selected. In each household, one adult has been randomly selected as main respondent.

The main reason for non-response was that the selected respondent (RSI) was not available during the period of the interview - this was particularly a problem in Koulikoro.

#### Questionnaire

In each household the household head, or other person that was available, was asked to respond to information concerning all the household members, the household roster. This was information about gender, age, education and main activity (see appendix 2). Based on this list of household-members, one of the adults (18+) was selected randomly (RSI=Randomly Selected Individual), and was asked the remaining part of the questionnaire.

The questionnaire used was a modified version of the questionnaire used as a background-survey for World Development Report 2011<sup>1</sup>. In Appendix 3 a comparison of the results from 2011 and 2014 is done.

While the 2011 questionnaire was focusing on the perceptions of conflict, security and development, the 2014 has a much larger emphasis on the religious life of the individuals.

#### The results

The data in this tabulation report are presented following the order of the questionnaire (see Appendix 2). The dependent variables are presented in rows, and the independent variables in columns. For the analyses of the households, the independent variables are urban/rural – while for the individual data they are in addition analyzed on gender.

#### Household heads

The most typical household head (HH-head) is a middle-aged male with no education, working in agriculture if he is living in rural areas, and working as an employee or in a small business if he lives in urban areas. However, there are some female headed households, more in urban than in rural area (14 vs 7 percent). The level of education of the HH-heads also varies between urban and rural area. As many as 93 percent of the rural HH heads have never gone to school or not achieved any level of education - while this is the case for 66 percent of the urban HH-heads. More than 40 percent of the HH-heads have attended Koran School, while less than 10 percent have attended Madrasa.

#### **Household members**




Figure 1 Age pyramid for all household members

Analysis of the household members shows that Mali has a young population, 2/3 are less than 25 years of age, and only 3 percent are more than 65 years of age (Figure 1). Also, among the relatively young population, the school attendance has been low. As many as 73 percent of the




Figure 2 Age pyramid of the selected RSIs compared to the total population

women age 6 years and above, and 62 percent of the men have never attended school or not achieved any level of education. In urban areas, the situation is somewhat better: 54 percent have at least achieved first primary. The urban population has also more frequently attended the Koranic schools and Madrasa, 31 percent Koran schools and 12 percent Madrasa, than in the rural areas where the similar numbers are 18 and 8.

## **Background**

The selected RSIs had an age- and gender-distributions similar to that of the rest of the population, with a slight overrepresentation of younger women and a similar slight under-representation of younger men (see Figure 2). More than 90 percent considered themselves as Muslims, with no differences between men and women (B05). However, while 2/3 of the Muslims will say they are 'Muslims', the remaining 1/3 will give a specification of which congregation they belong.

They identified themselves more as 'Malian' then identified by their ethnic group. However, they had a more or less equally strong identification to their religious identity as to their national or ethnic identity. It is worth mentioning that for nearly 1 out of 5 their identification was only religious, and not ethnic and national (B04², B06, B07).

In general very few are very satisfied with their living conditions. Most people think that they belong to the groups in the middle. Nevertheless around 1/3 consider their living conditions as bad (B12), the same level as will say they are among the poor (B13), and are not satisfied with their own living conditions (score 0-3 out of 10 on a scale, B14a).

### **Security**

Around 16 percent of the adult population feel unsafe during day-time and 28 percent feel unsafe during night-time (most of the time unsafe, or never safe, SE21, SE22). These levels are somewhat increased from the levels reported in 2011, where they were 11 percent during day-time and 24 percent during night-time.

More than half of the adult population means that the family law according to Sharia should be used in Mali, and nearly half means that the Sharia penal code should be used in the country (SE30, SE31). There are slightly more women than men and slightly more rural than urban dwellers that are in favour of the Sharia laws.

Only 2-3 percent of the adult population would accept that their sons and daughters join militant Islamic groups – this is also the level of how many would join militant Islamic groups themselves (SE72, SE73, SE74).

#### Recreation




Figure 3 Use of information sources weekly or more often

Urban dwellers have an easier access to information through radio, TV, newspapers and internet than the rural population. In rural areas, 57 listen at least weekly to radio, 32 percent watch TV, but only 1 percent read newspapers and surf on the internet. In urban areas, 73 listen to radio at least weekly, 68 watch TV, 14 percent surf on the internet and 10 percent read newspapers (LO01, LO02, LO04, LO10). As Figure 3 shows, it is the urban men that are the only ones reading newspapers and surfing on the internet. In general, urban dwellers are more exposed to radio and TV than rural, and men are more exposed than women.

#### **Confidence**




Figure 4 Confidence with political parties, elected local leaders, SERVAL and MINUSMA

More than 90 percent of the adult population have a great deal of confidence towards religious leaders, armed Malian forces and traditional leaders - no differences are found among the urban and rural population, nor among men and women (TR02, TR04, TR19). On the opposite end of the scale, was rebel groups and Islamic groups (TR20, TR21), only 2 percent had confidence in rebel groups, and 9 percent in the Islamic groups, also here, no particular differences between gender and area. From the long list of institutions the respondents were asked, there were only four institutions where particular difference between gender and between urban and rural area were seen. As Figure 4 shows, the rural women have a much higher confidence in the French SERVAL soldiers, and the UN-mission MINUSMA than the urban males have (TR22, TR23). Confidence is higher in rural areas than in urban areas, and it is a higher confidence among women than among men. The exact same pattern is found for confidence in political parties and elected local leaders – highest confidence among rural women, and lowest among urban men (TR10, TR11).

## Religion




Figure 5 Number of pillars (Faith in God, Prayer, Alms, Fasting and Pilgrimage) known by Muslims, by gender and area (number in parentheses is the average number of the group)

The vast majority of the adult population in Mali report that they are Muslims, 93 percent. Nearly all the Muslims pray every day – only 1 percent is never praying. Central in the religion, are the five pillars: Faith in God, Prayer, Alms, Fasting and Pilgrimage. Among the Muslims, 20 percent were able to mention all five of them. It is the urban males that are most familiar with all the five pillars (Figure 5). More than 60 percent of the rural women know only two of the pillars or fewer, while this is the case for 27 percent of the urban men.

#### **General opinions**

Concerning women's position in society, the respondents agree that women can participate in public life, such as vote in elections, participate in voluntary social activities and be members of municipal council or parliament. However, when it comes to the more private sphere, very few agree that a woman can disobey or divorce her husband, or that a woman can live alone (see Figure 6).

As shown in the tables later in this report (OP04 to OP19), there are no big differences in the perception of this between men and women, neither between the urban and rural population.

## **Prospects of the future**


In general, the adult population thinks that their living conditions today have improved compared to five years ago, and that the future will become even better, as shown in Figure 7. This is also the case when they judge the economic situation across the country.

Nearly half of the population thinks that their living conditions today are better than five years ago; nearly the same level that thinks the economic situation in the country is better. However, the urban and rural dwellers have a different judgement on the development of the economic situation in the country. While the majority of the urban dwellers thinks that the situation have become worse, the rural dwellers think it has become better. However, both the urban and rural populations have a positive view of the future, and 80 percent think the economic situation in Mali will be better in the next five years.

# Appendix 1 Sampling, inclusion probabilities and weights

### Sampling procedures for this survey

The FAFO / GREAT survey is a face-to-face questionnaire survey. It was conducted in the 5 southern regions in Mali (Kayes, Koulikro, Sikasso, Segou and Mopti) and in the District of Bamako. A primary sample of 90 clusters were selected, 45 urban and 45 rural. They were distributed proportional to the number of households in each stratum. The primary sampling unit (PSU), clusters, is the smallest geographically well-defined unit for which most national census data and maps are based.

In addition to the selection of clusters, the sampling procedure includes three other stages in each of the survey areas, slightly different in urban and rural area.

In *rural areas*, these three steps include:

- in the first step, make a list of local households, usually with village chief advisers;
- the second stage, randomly selecting fifteen households on the list of households;
- the third, and last step, select an individual respondent (*Randomly Selected Individual=RSI*) in each selected household, using true random draw from exclusive number-stickers attached to each questionnaire.

### At the *urban level*, the three steps include:

- in the first step, randomly select the starting points of sampling (SPS) in the cluster;
- in the second step, select the households by each 5/10 doors right and left in the direction of his march on the field;
- the third, and last step, select RSI in each selected household, using true random draw from exclusive number-stickers attached to each questionnaire.

### Selection of starting points

Based on the maps of the clusters provided by INSTAT, the supervisors randomly selected a starting point using a grid. He/she then placed a ruler on the side of the map, then uses a set of numbered cards to select a pair of numbers, one on the abscissa and one on the ordinate, resulting in a random pattern (e.g. 9 and 12) for each map of the clusters. A line was drawn horizontally on the map to the number selected on the side, and another line was drawn vertically to the number selected at the top. The intersection of these two lines on the map is the starting point of sampling. The starting point was marked on the map and the map was returned to the team of the locality. The team started interviewing in the house nearest possible to the SPS.

In each cluster, two SPS were selected before start, in case the primary SPS were inaccessible or inappropriate. The second SPS was also used as an additional starting point, when

there were not enough households around the initial SPS to accommodate all four members of the team.

If the starting point was a block of flats, or if the interval included a block of flats, then the interviewer started on the top floor and moved down. The first household that was selected was the fifth household, and then the interviewer moved downwards, interviewing every tenth household. This procedure was done by counting the apartments on the right and on the left.

### Selection of households

It was the interviewer's task to randomly select households following well defined procedures. A household is a group of people who usually share their meals and who recognize the authority of a member named Head of household.

Household selection was, as already mentioned, different in urban and rural areas. In rural clusters such as villages and hamlets, the 15 households in each cluster were randomly selected from the list previously established. In the village, such a list was obtained from the village chief or one of his advisers, a list which eliminates the need for a starting point and route in such surveys. Therefore, the supervisor proceeded by random drawing to select households to send directly to the interviewers. To do this, first, the total number of households was divided by 15 to draw the first household in the first batch quotient and gets the following households by successive addition of the quotient to the first draw. For example, in a village of 90 households, there is a total of 15 batches of 6 households each. The supervisor draw (by assistance from someone in the village) a random number between 1 and 6, for example, the number 2 is drawn, it is the first household to be investigated, other households are the numbers: 2 + 6 = 8, 8 + 6 = 14, and so on, or of which the sample households: 2, 8, 14, 20, 26, 32, 38, ..., 86.

In urban clusters, the starting point was selected previously by the supervisor, the interviewers walked in opposite directions. If A marched to the east, B walked in the opposite sense, that is to say, to the west; C and D walked in directions perpendicular to those of A and B respectively from the angles (north and south).

It was used a sampling interval of 5 to select the first household. The interviewer walked in the direction away from the SPS and selected the fifth household for the first interview, counting the houses as well on the right than as on the left (starting with the houses on the right). After the first interview, he/she continued in the same direction, this time selecting the 10<sup>th</sup> household, again counting the houses to the right and left. If he/she reached the end of the street and there were more houses to interview, he/she turned right and continued to walk while continuing to count to find the 10th household. So on, until completed 3 or 4 households assigned to him by the supervisor in each cluster.


### Selection of respondents

In the household, selecting the RSI depended on the number of adults. A selection of random number was already made for this purpose. To illustrate, if in the cluster 161 3043, there are 9 eligible adults in the household, **number 3** of the 9 adults was selected, and was the respondent for this survey.

### Inclusion probabilities and weights

The sample is in general a two stage sample, but with a third stage for the RSI.

### **Notation**

In order to describe the sample precisely and calculate inclusion probabilities we need to introduce some notation. This is done in Table 2.

The inclusion probabilities for a PSU c in stratum b is the following (for all strata except the 0 enumeration area stratum):

Note that the listed number of households is used, rather than the initial estimate of households from the census. The overall inclusion probability for a household then becomes:

Within each household, one person is randomly selected from the list of eligible members (i.e. persons aged 18 years and above). The inclusion probability for a RSI within the household is then:

The final inclusion probability for a RSI is then the product of the household inclusion probability (Equation 3) and the RSI (Equation 4).

### Sampling weights

The expansion weights are calculated as the inverse of the inclusion probabilities; while the relative weights are calculated as the expansion weight divided by the mean of all the expansion weights.

Thus, the expansion sampling weight for household i is:

The sampling weights as such are not used in estimation of survey results, because the sampling weights are adjusted for non-response as will be discussed below.

Sampling weights were created for both households and RSIs.

### Non-response and non-response corrections

The response rate that is achieved during the fieldwork of a survey is crucial for the quality of the survey results. When response rates are low, one may justifiably suspect biases in the results.

In general one may distinguish between two types of non-response: unit non-response and item non-response. Unit non-response pertains to the non-response of a whole unit, such as a household. In that case almost nothing is known about that household.

Item non-response pertains to the lack of information on a specific item for a unit, for instance, that a person does not answer questions about income. Here we will only consider unit non response.

### Unit non-response: the household

The results of the interviews or attempted interviews can be studied using a classification of non-response in the questionnaire, derived from Hidiroglou, Drew and Gray (1993). The response categories in the framework are given below.

The framework is built around the observation that an interview can be missing for two reasons. First, it may be that the selected household does not belong to the sampling frame. For instance, this is the case for diplomats which were not considered eligible. Second, a selected household, which actually exists and is eligible, may refuse, or not be found at home. Also, the classification has to take into account that there will be some situations where the interviewer cannot determine if a household exists or not. Interviewers also sometimes encounter the situation that the household is available for interview, but that no useful information can be obtained because the respondent is sick or otherwise incapable of answering.

### Non-response correction

Non-response always occurs. Nevertheless, since the extent and seriousness of non-response vary the plan of non-response correction must be reconsidered after the fieldwork.

### Weight adjustment and estimation weights

When there is unit non-response, direct use of the sampling weights will result in biased estimation. The biases generally take two forms. One is that when totals are estimated with sampling expansion weights, the total will be too small because non-response implies that units that should be added into the total are missing. The other form is that estimation may be biased because non-responding units may have particular characteristics.

One way to reduce the biases produced by unit non-response is to adjust the sampling weights. The method of correction of the weights for non-response that is used here, is the so-called "adjustment cell method" (see for instance Lehtonen and Pahkinen 1995; Little and

Rubin 1987). In this approach, households that are considered to be fairly similar are identified and the non-response rate calculated for each group of households, called adjustment cells. In line with the description above, when non-response rates are calculated, only the non-response of those that could have responded but for some reason did not do so is considered.

The inverse of the response rate in each adjustment cell is then used to adjust the sampling weights (both expansion and relative) for each household. The result is the so-called estimation weights, both expansion and relative. The weighted sample size is now, as it would have been if all households had responded. The effect is also to increase the relative contribution to the estimates of units that are similar to those missing.

In the present study the adjustment cells used are likely to consist of a number of geographically adjacent PSUs.

Using the notation in Table 5, the correction factor to the weights for non-response is given in 9.

The number of possible interviews (i.e. the denominator in the non-response rate) is the sum of categories 1,2,3,5,10 and 11 in Table 2. The number of non-respondent units is the sum of the categories 5, 10 and 11. The Status Not Determined category may be distributed over the other categories.

The effect of the corrections is that the expansion weights are increased so that the sum of the estimated expansion weights corresponds to the sum of units in the sample frame (less non-existent or non-eligible units). The relative estimation weights are normalised. This means that the sum of the weights is the sum of the household records in the data file.

This type of non-response correction is carried out for the household and the RSI responses. For each, adjustment cells were formed by using the concatenation of the province and urban rural designation.

### **Extreme weights correction**

Correction is also done to the extreme weights, following the rules that the max of weights should not be higher than median+2\*stddev; the min of weights should not be lower than median/3.

### **Relative weights**

Considering the lack of calibration of the sample expansion weights based on the population information, relative weights are used for both households and RSI respondents.

Relative weights are kept for the households with interview status 'complete interview', 'refusal converted', 'partly complete interview' and 'no contract to RSI respondents'.

Relative weights are kept for the RSI respondents with interview status 'complete interview', 'refusal converted' and 'partly complete interview'.

# Religious reorientation in Southern Mali – Tabulation report

While the increasing significance of radical Salafist Islam in the North of Mali is well known, religious reorientation in the South has received much less public attention. In a series of reports, we focus on changes in views on politics, religion and social conditions among Muslims in Southern Mali. The studies are based on data collected in Mali in June 2014, both during in-depth interviews with religious and political leaders, and in a perception survey among 1210 adults in Southern Mali. The study was funded by the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This report presents the tabulated results from the perception survey.
